

The Proctors draw the attention of members of the University to the following:

6. *Public Performances and Flyposting*

Organisers of performances and entertainments on University or college premises must seek advice and permission from the relevant authorities in advance.

Performances and other entertainments in public, whether indoors or outdoors, may require a licence from the Cambridge City Council or the South Cambridgeshire District Council. Requirements and procedures are governed, in particular, by the Theatres Act 1968 and the Licensing Act 2003. Organisers and promoters are subject to other legal duties and liabilities, especially in connection with health and safety and public order. The local authorities publish relevant guidance.

Flyposting—i.e., fixing posters and other items to buildings, railings, trees, etc. on University or College property without permission—is a breach of the *Rules of Behaviour* for Registered Students and of the discipline regulations for other members of the University. It is also contrary to the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (on private property) and the Highways Act 1980 (in a public place). The Cambridge City Council acts against flyposting within the City, and those who fail to remove illegal postings after notice from the Council may be prosecuted.
